Judge upholds IVDA contract to local firm

REDLANDS — San Bernardino County Superior Court Judge James A. Edwards upheld the Inland Valley Development Agency's board of directors' decision to award a S3 million construction contract to Redlands-based J. Murrey Construction Co. early this moming.

The IVDA board of directors voted 5-4 on July 26 to award the construct to J. Murray Construction: despite its staff's recommendation to give Norce contractor Gorham Construction the nod for the renovation of four TRW buildings at the former Norton Air Force Base.

Based on the decision, the IVDA can proceed with the TRW project.

"The conset for Gerham can appeal," said Edward Pilot, coursel representative for J. Morrey Construction. "But while this is going on, the IVDA is mencumbered from starting remodeling these buildings."

Edwards stated in his decision that "time is of the essence" in this case and that the IVDA board is not bound to its staff's recommendation.

While Gorham Construction will likely pursue this case in the Fourth District Court of Appeals, the decision temporarily quells TRW's unespiness about the logistical and financial failout that would have transpired if the court ordered the screging of all bids.
